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3. Thailand Implementations

- Ministry of Tourism and Sports expresses its confident at the meeting of the House of Representatives to administer the COVID-19 vaccine to 70% of the people in tourist areas by June 2021. It also set the target that from 1 October 2021 onward, 10 tourist destination provinces including Bangkok, Chiang Mai, Prachuap Khiri Khan, Phetchaburi, Chonburi, Phuket, Surat Thani, Krabi, Phang Nga, and Buriram, will be opened for tourists without a quarantine requirement.
- The Tourism Authority of Thailand (TAT) confirms that Thailand will open the country using the "Phuket Sandbox" model. Starting from 1 July 2021, the country will be opened for foreign tourists who have completed the full doses of COVID-19 vaccination to visit specified areas according to the "Sealed Route" without a quarantine requirement. The TAT will propose details of the "Sealed Route" and guidelines for tourists to the meeting of the CCSA on 4 June 2021.

4. Risk Assessment of COVID-19 Situation

The COVID-19 vaccination situation, as of 3 June 2021, 4,295,,889 doses of COVID-19 vaccines have been allocated to all 77 provinces across the country. There have been 3,959,356 vaccinated people composed of 2,738,289 people who have received one dose and 1,221,067 people who have completed the 2 doses. The vaccination coverage among the population aged over 18 years is 7.50%. During the early period of the vaccine rollout, an average of 17,000 vaccinated people per day. During the past month (since 3 May 2021), there are at least 63,000 vaccinated people per day. If the vaccination continues at this rate, there will be at least 6.2 million people receiving at least one dose of the vaccines by next month. The government has increased the number of vaccination service posts to facilitate the people's easy access to the vaccination. The current priority groups of people who should be vaccinated include those who work in communities or crowded places as well as those who work in public services., especially in outbreak areas, elderly people and people with chronic diseases. However, the D-M-H-T-T measures must be followed along with the vaccination to reduce the disease spreading.
